Thank you to all who helped us to exceed our \$120,000 Annual Campaign goal! So many generous donors stepped up to help us raise a net total of \$138,195!

An Update on the Building on Our Blessings Campaign:

Thank you to those of you who pledged or made a donation for our Building Campaign! To date, we have raised over \$590,000 and have pledges totaling another \$602,000. That is a grand total of \$1,182,368 in donations and pledges. Thank you to those who have given so far, and we ask you to prayerfully consider supporting this Campaign so we can begin building as soon as possible!

MT Tax Credit Scholarship Program

It's time to participate in the Montana Tax Credit Scholarship Program! There is \$6M in tax credits available in 2025, but you need to act before January 15! Last year we raised \$167K with this program, and this year I'd love to see us at least double that number. As Montanans, we have an incredible opportunity to redirect our 2025 estimated Montana state income tax liability to MCS Scholarships and help those who want a quality Christian Education for their kids! 90% of all we receive must go to scholarships. The Big Sky Scholarship Tax Credit Program is quite simple: you donate to MCS for scholarships, MCS secures a 100% dollar for dollar tax credit from the state on your behalf, and your state tax liability for 2025 is reduced or eliminated. You cannot deduct your gift as a charitable donation in Montana as you are receiving a dollar-for-dollar credit off your state taxes. This shouldn't be confused with your charitable donations, as this is designed to take the tax dollars you would normally pay the state and support the school with them instead. You will receive a dollar-for-dollar tax credit on your 2025 taxes.



MT Tax Credit Scholarship Cont.

How to Participate

- Limits are \$200,000 (individual) or \$400,000 (married filing jointly).
- Individuals, estates or trusts, corporations, partnerships, and LLCs all qualify to participate!
- Tax credits can be carried forward for three years.
- To make your donation, please write your check to MCS, include the last four of your Social Security number if donating personally, or your EIN if your business is donating.
- Please bring or mail your personal or Business Check to the school prior to January 15.
- Checks should be made payable to Manhattan Christian School and must be dated January 1 or later.

Important Notes

- MCS must receive your donation BEFORE we can submit your information to the state to claim your tax credits when the program opens on January 15. MCS will begin submitting tax credit requests via the state portal the moment the program opens on January 15 and continue until the \$6M cap has been met.
- If the \$6M cap is exhausted before we can enter your check, you will receive the check back and it will not be cashed.

2024 Volleyball: All In

Earlier this November, our volleyball girls faced a tough loss against White Sulphur Springs, placing third in the Divisional tournament, ending our season sooner than any of us hoped for since only two advance to State.



I am still so proud. Our girls were so young. We made so many changes throughout the season. Last year we graduated six seniors and this year started two, sometimes three freshmen. Our freshmen and sophomores did an incredible job of filling big shoes. Stepping straight from middle school into varsity high school volleyball is no joke. Our juniors and seniors led so well. They truly set a top notch example for our younger athletes. To make it as far as we did was quite an accomplishment in itself, but that's not even what I am most proud of. This group of girls was so full of joy, grace, and humility. The didn't lose a lot of games, but when they did, not much changed after the game. We would shake hands with the opposing team and I would watch senior, Sam Veltkamp, invite the opposing coach to pray with them. Nearly every team took them up on that offer this season; they created so many opportunities to be witnesses. They were consistently complimented on their joy, demeanor, politeness, and talent. Dan Chesnet, Sports reporter from the Belgrade News, has always done an incredible job of covering our athletes: he comes to tons of games, takes and posts great pictures, and always has a great write up in the weekly issues. We are so thankful for his dedication to highlight our athletes' hard work. While we hosted Districts I met another reporter, Jeff Schlapp from the Park County Dugout. He tagged us in one of his articles, so I signed up to read it, and I legitimately cried. Throughout the postseason, he continued to write such sincere things about our girls, and I was so thankful that someone from the "outside" noticed what's even more impressive than the girls' athleticism. Here are a few quotes from his recent articles:

The Manhattan Christian volleyball team reminds me of the Chicago Bulls during their six-NBA title run... I watched the Lady Eagles get up from the stands to go to the locker room to get ready for their match against the Shields Valley Lady Rebels. As I watched the girls depart for their locker room, I thought, 'they carry themselves with such class.' Like the Chicago Bulls, who won six NBA championships between 1991 and 1998 with two three peats. Every gym they walk into, teams are gunning for them. We are talking about high school girls; their pressure must be immense. They don't gloat when they win; there is no showboating. No showing up their opponents. When they lost earlier in the season to the Rebels, they did so with class. Yet, they have fun on the court between points like everyone else. They happen to be great at volleyball. But like those Bulls teams, they were on a mission. The Bulls were on a mission to be the best, to win. I spoke with someone yesterday [It was Layne, our athletic director, but he never asked for permission to quote him so he left his name out.] who told me that the girls want to win also. If they win state, that's great, but their mission is to serve Jesus Christ, use the talents God has bestowed upon them, and serve their school and community first, doing Christ's work. That's a rare perspective. As I said a few weeks ago, I like the Eagles.

After our experiences with other reporters who have failed to print when our athletes or coaches point to God (Side note, there was recently a great article in the Madisonian about the culture of our athletic programs; it's posted on our school's Facebook: a MUST read!), I am just so thankful he was willing to include it all.

In another article, he continues about his interview with Sam after the District championship: But the girl who impressed me the most didn't win, at least on the court. The Eagles senior libero talked briefly about the loss. She told me that she wasn't upset over the loss and that she and her teammates tried and played the best they could. It wasn't so much that the Eagles lost. Instead, the Bruins played fantastic and won, she told me it was great when the Eagles won and she and her teammates wanted to win , they were even eager for a rematch. However, her goal was to use the talent God gave her and it was important to her to live her life on and off the court, setting the example of Christ. Veltkamp seems to understand a life lesson at the young age of 18. If you look back on your life when you were 80, and the worst thing that happened to you was that your team lost a high school game, you led a pretty good life... Later he wrote, When it was all over, the Eagles gathered as they always do, near center court, as a team to say a prayer, and there in the middle was Veltkamp, smiling and motioning to Ellie Reinerston to join them in prayer. Amazing. Truly amazing.

I've decided that this season of life is too short to miss out on evenings and weekends at home. I told our girls a tearful "see you later" while I take my high school coaching "sabbatical." I also told Hanna she has to find someone who is willing to take my job only until I want it back; I am very high maintenance. What a gift it was to coach alongside Hanna and Johanna these last few years. I laughed so much, learned so much, and drank so much coffee.

There are a number of people who deserve our thanks after a jam-packed fall sports season: all of our bench workers, line judges, ticket takers, concessions workers, MEC cleaners, our athletic director, staff, and faculty of Manhattan Christian.
