#### Spring Music Highlights; Well Done, MCS Musicians!

This has been the most successful year of Music Festival I have ever experienced! In April, we had the opportunity to bring our band and choir students to the District Music Festival: Bozeman for Large Ensembles, and Helena for Solos and Small Ensembles. Our small choir of ten students was so brave and did an outstanding job, receiving an Excellent score for their prepared songs of "Oh Shenandoah" and "Let Us Sing." They also received a Good score on their sight-reading, which was a new experience for almost all of them. A special shout out is in order to Oren Arthun, our only male singer, who carried his part by himself! And thank you to Faith Dyksterhouse for being our accompanist at the festival. Our band did a truly tremendous job, receiving a Superior score (the highest possible) for our prepared pieces of "Fidelity March" by Karl L. King and "Exaltation" by James Swearingen, and a Superior for their sight-reading as well. The judges had high praise for our small band of fourteen students, and remarked how good our balance and blend was. The results of the Solos and Small Ensembles truly blew me away. We came to Helena bright and early with thirteen entries: one vocal trio, two vocal duets, two instrumental solos, two instrumental duets, and six vocal solos. Eleven of these entries received the highest score, Superior, and two received the second highest, Excellent.

We were able to take nine of those Superior entries on to the State Music Festival in Billings in early May. The students did an incredible job, and each and every entry received another Superior, and Grace Aamot's solo even had a perfect score! She sang "If I Can Help Somebody" by Alma Androzzo, and Professor Stephen Hart from Rocky Mountain College said she was the best singer he heard at the festival.

It was awesome to watch all of the adjudicators work with our students. Oren Arthun sang "O Danny Boy" as a solo, and then got to work with the five other young men that sang in his block, and Professor Bethany Smith-Jacobs of Laramie County Community College worked with all of them with their breathing, tone production, and use of vowels. Professor Brian Murray from the University of Wyoming worked with many of our singers, including Haley Sander, Kaitlyn Scott, Kyanna Hoekema, and Grace Aamot on their various solos, and small ensembles. A big thank you is in order to Julie Bussis and Vic Veltkamp, who accompanied all of our students. Tyler Menzales, principal flutist of the Billings Symphony Orchestra & Chorale, worked with our own flutists, Sierra Flikkema and Baylee Roberts. All told, our students had a wonderful experience and were able to get a lot of valuable feedback from experts in their fields.

I am so proud of these hardworking students and their dedication to their craft. It is so encouraging to see the next generation rising up as not only young people with a good work ethic and brilliant creativity, but also humble hearts and God-glorifying attitudes. The past three years of teaching at MCS have been the best teaching experience I have ever had, even in spite of the challenges of COVID-19 my first year! I love this community and the wonderful privilege of being able to share my faith openly with my students and encourage them spiritually. God has opened the door for me to pursue my Master's degree at The University of Idaho-Moscow with an emphasis in Choral Conducting. This is a bittersweet time for me. I am excited for what God will bring in the next chapter of my life, but I am also saddened that I won't be able to continue seeing how these amazing student musicians progress in the years to come. I will be praying for them, that they will become more like Christ as they learn and grow, becoming bright lights for His kingdom.

In the auditorium at Bozeman High School, the West Yellowstone High School band preceded Manhattan Christian's. They were larger, easily doubling our group, and they were very good. I understand that Nancy McPherson, their director, has been there quite a few years, but is retiring this year. She announced that they were playing a piece by Berlioz, and after that the "1812 Overture" by Tchaikovsky My eyebrows went up; serious stuff. These pieces were no small task for a high school band. They did very, very well. A hard act to follow.

The MC band of 14 students came next. Seems like they even sat closer together, the better to hear each other and looking somewhat small on that large stage. When Mr. Chaussé got the signal to begin, he introduced himself, the band, and the pieces they would be playing. My eyes opened wide again! I do believe there was not a weak link in that band. They also had to sight-read a piece for the adjudicators. Given a few minutes to study the music, they aced it as far as sight-reading is concerned. The final summation: a Superior rating in both categories. From what I could hear of the adjudicator's comments, he had heard hundreds of bands over the years, but he could count on one hand the bands of this size that sounded so good. Why so good? All the rehearsals, of course. But I couldn't help but think of Pep Band. Playing at numerous volleyball and basketball games is not as easy as it sounds. When the next peppy number is called, they have to find it in their folder, quickly scan for tempo and key signature, and away they go. It's not exactly sight-reading, but it certainly contributes to adaptability and competence. Last but not least, it's great fun. If you didn't get to be there, perhaps tell the band members, "Heard you did a great job at the District Festival," because they most certainly did.

#### Thank You, Departing Teachers!




#### Introducing the Newest Eagle



#### "Stuff Da Bus" Collects Over a Ton of Canned Food



#### **Annual Update**

From the 2023 Association Meeting

In the past year, your contribution to the cause totaled \$135,500 coming from a total of 11 donors and memorials received totaled \$33,445. Our thanks to those who have included us in their giving plans as well as to those that have included us as a part of their wills and estate plans. This year the Foundation has committed \$110,000 for the 2023-2024 year. Unfortunately, you will note that the contribution to the school is down significantly, in part because of a poorer economy, and partly because donations and annuities are also declining.

#### A few notes to encourage greater participation in a significant source for the MCS budget: We need more members!

The Foundation began in 86-87 and grew to 104 members in the first 10 years; it was up to 130 after 20 years. It reached its peak at 150, but since the end of 2022, we are now at 97 members. New membership levels were established in 2021 at \$100/year maintaining, \$500/year sustaining, and \$1,000/year embracing. Check with a board member or the school office for an application to join our mission of lowering tuition.
