End-of-Year Fundraising Campaign & Building on our Blessings Kick Off

As the end of the year approaches, I wanted to take the opportunity to encourage you to plan to include MCS in your end of year giving plans. The MCS Board continues to emphasize keeping tuition affordable, and to do that, we must supplement our income through giving. The MCS Foundation provides funds each year to help offset tuition costs. The Thrift Store generously donates a large sum each year to support the school, and the Friends Organization, who manages all fundraising events in the school, also provides funds through the various events they manage, whether it be Harvest Festival, Tulip Mania and Dutch Supper, or the Elementary Fun Run. Concessions raises money so that we don't have to charge athletic fees to pay for uniforms, coaches, referees, and other expenses usually charged at other schools. Your volunteering in all of these events helps us maximize those resources. We are one big team making this all happen.

I spoke with an administrator at a Christian school in Colorado this week and just for fun, I looked at their tuition and it was upwards of \$16,000. Schools in other high-cost areas charge upwards of \$20,000! We strive to keep tuition as affordable as we can because we do not want cost to be the determining factor when choosing MCS for your student. To accomplish that, we must supplement income through fundraising.

We have some opportunities approaching to help us fulfill this desire for manageable tuition. First, we are also gearing up for our annual Campaign Dinner on November 19th. Dr Erik Hoekstra, President of Dordt University will be joining us as our guest speaker, and we will have a wonderful meal, beautiful entertainment from our kids, and a dessert auction as well. Our goal at this event is twofold this year. We have set a target to raise \$120,000 for our end-of-year goal, supporting operating costs at the school.

Secondly, we are kicking off fundraising efforts for our "Building on our Blessings" construction campaign for the new Middle School and Elementary School wing. (Continue reading on page 2)

By now, you should have received an invitation in the mail, which included a return envelope for the Annual Campaign, as well as a pledge form for Building on Our Blessings. Please RSVP for the event if you haven't already, and prayerfully consider how you can support the school in meeting the \$120,000 year end goal and send that gift in the provided envelope into the school.

Then, prayerfully consider how you can support the long-term future of the school through a pledge and gift to begin (and ultimately finish) our building project. We'd ask you to carefully consider supporting this very necessary project!

Lastly, I'd like to remind you of the Montana Education Donations program, of which MCS is a Student Sponsorship Organization. Each year, the State of Montana sets aside 5 million dollars of tax credits for people and businesses to donate to private schools and in return, receive a tax credit for that amount on their Montana State taxes. The window for donations opens again on January 1st and closes when the \$5 million dollar limit has been reached. Last year we received \$167,000 from this effort, and the stipulation is that 90% of the funds raised must go to scholarships. If you would like to give your tax dollars to support the school, please contact me and I will further explain the program. Essentially, you are giving the school what you would normally give the state, and you receive a dollar for dollar credit off your tax bill. There are some limitations and some rules, but I'm happy to talk with you about them, and would encourage you to speak to your financial planner/accountant about this as well.

Thank you for your generosity towards the school. For 117 years families have been sacrificing to make this school a reality and to keep it affordable for all who would like to attend. Please help us continue to make that a reality!

For my senior project, I want to help the high school body improve their worship during chapel. To do this, I am learning how to play the guitar and will take over part of the worship leading aspects.


New Notes: The Happenings of the Music Department

Rodeo Success for the MCS Bolich Boys

Each year, in conjunction with the annual NILE Pro Rodeo held at the Metra in Billings, the top two ranked high school athletes in each of their respective events get invited to the NILE High School Showcase. It's an exciting opportunity, as it is the first time that high school athletes get to compete alongside top pro rodeo competitors. On October 12, Blaise Bolich, a Junior here at MCS, was invited to compete in the Tie Down Roping at the High School Showcase after wrapping up the fall season sitting in second place in the Montana High School Rodeo Association. Each high school contestant's run at the NILE High School Showcase is an exhibition run with the pro rodeo competitors as they are technically not old enough to compete at the professional level yet. Blaise and his horse Power made an outstanding run of 9.6 seconds in the Tie Down Roping. Blaise was awarded a beautiful buckle for the win! The Montana High School Rodeo spring season will kick off again in March with the state finals being held in Kalispell in June and Nationals being held in Rock Springs, Wyoming in July.



The last weekend of October was the conclusion of the 2024 Northern Rodeo Association season with the finals being held in Kalispell. Brooks Bolich, a Freshman at MCS, capped off a great year by placing in both rounds and winning second in the average at the finals. Brooks won the year end title for Junior Breakaway Roping, winning a beautiful belt buckle and his first trophy saddle! Bentz Bolich, a 7th grader at MCS, also had a great season. He placed in the first round of the finals and finished the year as the Reserve Champion in the Junior Breakaway Roping for the 2024 season. The boys were also very excited that their special horse Annie was voted the "Junior Breakaway Roping Horse of the Year" by their fellow competitors!
