

Slave

I was in Saskatchewan bear hunting a couple weeks ago, and during my time there, I was studying I Corinthians and reading John MacArthur's book, "Slave; the Hidden Truth about Your Identity in Christ." I had a lot of time on my hands, as the weather was miserable, and no bears were moving in the downpours and wind.

As I read the book, I was struck by a couple of key thoughts. The first is a proper understanding of the Greek word doulos, which appears 124 times in the original texts, but only translated correctly once in the King James version. Duolos translates to slave. In the 123 other uses of the word, it is translated to servant. This was done in large part because of the connotations of slavery at the time of translation. The concept of Greco-Roman slavery was different than the slavery that was happening at the time of translation so various forms of the word "servant" were used in its place. The problem is there is a key distinction between the two words. Servants are hired, slaves are owned. To be someone's slave was to be someone's possession, bound to obey the owner's will without hesitation or argument. MacArthur writes, "The gospel is not simply an invitation to become Christ's associate: it is a mandate to become His slave."

The Apostle Paul referred to himself as a "slave of Christ" and a "Slave of God"; and he and his readers knew exactly what that meant. Paul's life revolved around his master—Christ. Nothing else, including his own personal agenda mattered. Jesus' brother, James called himself "James, a slave of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ. (James 1:1).

In a time when we speak of personal ambition, personal fulfillment, personal gratification, and even the concept of a personal relationship with Jesus Christ, we lose sight of the gospel where sinners are called to submit to Christ. Jesus is not here to fulfill your wishes like a personal trainer or personal assistant.

MacArthur writes, "The New Testament understanding of the believer's relationship to Christ could not be more opposite. He is the Master and Owner. We are His possession. He is the King, the Lord, and the Son of God. We are His subjects and His subordinates. In a word, we are His slaves."

Lastly, MacArthur writes: "True Christianity is not about adding Jesus to my life. Instead, it is about devoting myself completely to Him—submitting wholly to His will and seeking to please Him above all else. It demands dying to self and following the Master, no matter the cost. In other words, to be a Christian is to be Christ's slave." What a radical concept. Now I am transfixed by what this means to how I approach absolutely everything.

National Merit Scholarship Finalist: Ryan Schott

A huge congratulations is in order for MCS Senior, Ryan Schott! Ryan has made it as one of the finalists for the National Merit Scholarship! National Merit is based on scores on last year's Preliminary SAT (PSAT/NMQT) college entrance exam. Ryan is among one of the 16,000 semifinalists announced earlier last month. In February, the 15,000 finalists will be announced and are then considered the top 1% of the 1.5 million juniors who took the test nationwide last year. The finalists will compete for 7,250 National Merit Scholarships worth over \$30 million offered this spring. All Merit Scholar designees are chosen based on their abilities, accomplishments, and potential for success in rigorous college studies — without regard to gender, race, ethnic origin, religious preference, or family financial circumstances.
